Cycle 3, Week 15- Georgia O'Keeffe

Materials:

- "Purple Petunias" templates printed on cardstock (see page 2)
- Color print(s) of "Purple Petunias" by Georgia O'Keeffe (see page 3)
- Paintbrushes, large and small sizes
- Tempera paint
- Water
- Cups
- Paper towels
- Paper plates
- Images of Georgia O'Keeffe's work
- 1. Discuss images of Georgia O'Keeffe's work. What was she inspired by? Why do you think she painted close-up images of flowers rather than the typical still-life of flowers in a vase? Describe her brushstrokes: smooth, choppy, blurred, dotted? (5 minutes)
- 2. Walk students through painting "Purple Petunias" step-by-step. Do not let them work ahead. We want them to slow down, study what they see, and be thoughtful about their work.
 - 1. Start with the flower in the back. Use a large paint brush to paint the blue.
 - 2. Add red and white to create the lighter areas.
 - 3. Use a small paint brush to add the black shadows and fill in the center of the flower
 - 4. Paint the front flower in the same way. Study the colors and make sure that this flower has more pink.
 - 5. After adding the black shadows and center, use the small paint brush to add the green and grey shapes in the center of each flower.
